SUBJECT: TASK FORCE OPERATIONS

DIVISION: EMERGENCY OPERATIONS

Objective: To establish responsibility for Task Force Operations and outline Task Force procedures.

Section 1: "Task Force Operations" refers to a temporary grouping of apparatus and personnel assigned to one Commander to carry out a specific operation.

- A. Task Force Operational Procedures are designed to accomplish the following:
 - 1. To establish a framework through which apparatus and personnel will function during Task Force operations.
 - 2. To provide for the establishment of Task Force operations during disasters, disturbances, or mass mutual aid assistance.
 - 3. To systematically group fire apparatus in a base of operation which, in turn, may be dispatched as a Task Force or by individual unit.
 - 4. To provide a means for carrying out the orderly formation and continued command of Task Force Units during its total function.
- B. The establishment of a Task Force Operation shall be determined by the on-call Division Chief of Field Operations, or the Assistant Chief of Field Operations. (Keep in mind that more than one Task Force may be assembled, if necessary).
 - 1. The Officer establishing a Task Force Operation shall designate who the Task Force Commander will be and notify same.
 - a. "Task Force Commander" refers to the individual who is in total command of a Task Force Operation. This individual is to be a Division/Battalion Commander, or above, within the rank structure of the Baltimore County Fire Department. (Acting Division/Battalion Chiefs will be included)
 - 2. It will be the responsibility of the Task Force Commander to immediately notify Dispatch of a Task Force formation. The Task Force Commander will designate a base location, indicate its identification, and advise Fire Dispatch of the selection of equipment to be dispatched to same.
 - a. "Base Location" Base of operations for ground apparatus to form Task Force.
 - b. Task Force Base location shall be identified by:
 - 1) Task Force Base "A"
 - 2) Task Force Base "B," and to continue in sequence as required.
 - Once the Task Force has been established, all communications regarding the Task Force will be directed to the Task Force Commander.

- 4. Once established, Fire Dispatch shall announce, on all talkgroups, that a Task Force has become operational.
- 5. The Task Force Commander and Fire Dispatch shall maintain a close liaison at all times.
 - a. Upon the initiation of a Task Force Operation, Fire Dispatch shall notify the Fire Chief and his staff.
 - 1) When a Task Force Operation is initiated, it will be the responsibility of the Task Force Commander to have their position covered within their Division/Battalion.
 - 2) The area of involvement and designated need of a Task Force Operation will indicate the use of career and volunteer units within the Task Force makeup.
 - The suggested equipment to be included in a Task Force Operation is as follows: four (4) Engines, one (1) Ladder Truck, and one (1) Medic Unit.
 - 4) The Task Force Commander must consider the length of time a Task Force may remain operational, as it could warrant the callback of off-duty personnel to staff reserve equipment.
 - 5) The Task Force Commander must also consider the following factors:
 - a) fuel for apparatus
 - b) sleeping facilities for personnel
 - c) meals for personnel, and
 - d) relief for personnel
 - 6) It shall be the responsibility of the Task Force Commander to ensure adequate security for their unit, when required. This could necessitate the dispatch of Police units with the Task Force.
 - 7) The ranking officer of the incident, necessitating a Task Force Operation, shall be responsible for its termination.
